

### Weymouth and Portland at a glance

- The health of people in Weymouth and Portland is showing a mixed picture. Life expectancy and deprivation levels are similar to the England average. The rate of violent crime and the proportion of children achieving 5 GCSEs (grades A\*-C including English and Maths) are worse than the England average.
- There are inequalities within Weymouth and Portland;
  life expectancy for men in the most deprived areas is
  almost 8 years less than for those in the least deprived.
- Over the last 10 years, the rates of death from all causes combined and of early death from heart disease and stroke have fallen.
- The proportion of children taking part in at least 3 hours of school sport a week, and the proportion of mothers initiating breastfeeding are both better than the England average. However, the proportion of women smoking in pregnancy is worse than for England.
- The rate of malignant melanoma skin cancer is higher than for England as a whole.
- Over 1,500 people claimed incapacity benefit for mental illness in Weymouth and Portland in 2008, which is high compared to the England average.
- The Dorset Local Area Agreement has prioritised tackling levels of physical activity, smoking and tobacco control, healthy weight, alcohol misuse and teenage pregnancy.






This chart shows the percentage of the population in England, this region, and this area who live in each of these quintiles.






### Health inequalities: a local view

## Health inequalities: changes over time



Trend 1 compares rates of death, at all ages and from all causes, in this area with those for England.


Trend 2 compares rates of early death from heart disease and stroke (in people under 75) in this area with those for England.

Trend 1: All age, all cause mortality



Trend 3: Early death rates from cancer


